In The Kitchen

Fabulous French Toast

*1 egg *1/4 cup of milk

* dash of Vanilla * 1 tbsp butter

*2 pieces of bread

egg mixture. Cook the bread on low
heat until the underside is brown (5
min) then flip over and cook again
for 5 min. Serve with maple syrup,

Health and Wellness

Kids and Breakfast It is especially important that kids eat breakfast. Missing the most important meal of the day can cause health problems and harm children's growth and development. Kids who don't eat breakfast have a greater chance of getting lower grades, having learning and behavioural challenges, and may develop nutritional deficiencies. Kids who regularly skip breakfast are more likely to have problems with obesity as well as tooth decay. Busy lifestyles make it easy to skip breakfast, however eating breakfast with your kids sets a good example. Keep meals simple in the morning and stick to the basics. Serve simple foods that are nutritious yet quick.

Here are some tips for breakfast in a hurry.
*serve instant oatmeal on cold mornings
*buy a variety of whole grain Cereals which are
low in sugar

*Cheese sandwiches, scrambled egg burritos and other finger foods can be eaten quickly on the go

*encourage kids to drink a glass of milk if they skip their Cereal

*fruit and yogurt smoothies can seem like a treat and not breakfast

*spread some Cream Cheese or peanut butter on toast or a bagel

*pre-Cut fruit the night before and have a yummy and nutritious fruit salad drizzled with yogurt in the morning

*eggs are packed with nutrition whether they're boiled, poached, scrambled or fried *Although sometimes it may be unavoidable try to get your kids to eat breakfast while sitting down instead of on the go.

Playing Around

Here are some activity ideas...

For a Toddler aged 1 to 2: Iceberg in a cup What you'll need: yogurt Container and a plastic toy or Car

- 1. Plan this surprise a day ahead. Fill the container with water (food colouring too if you wish) and place the toy inside the cup then freeze it in your freezer.
- 2. The next day, provide your child with a container holding lukewarm water and some water toys like spoons, measuring cups, colander, etc as well as the big ice cube containing the toy! As he plays with it, the toy will gradually emerge!

For Preschoolers aged 3 to 4: Placemats. Use a large sheet of construction paper and let your child decorate them as they wish. You can also pre-cut shapes for them before you start. Pick a theme if it is near a holiday. Glue the shapes on, use glitter, let their imaginations go wild. They look great on your table and if food spills on them, oh well! You can make another one tomorrow! Laminate the keepers!
